Somewhat of a wildlife geek, I spent part of last summer monitoring the 3 active osprey



nests on our lake. One was on our eagle platform by Blue Heron Point, another across the lake from Horse Island, and the third at the far end of the lake by Lost Bay. All three had babies - 1 chick in 2 of them and 2 chicks in the nest across from Horse Island. Having 3 osprey nests producing chicks

is a positive sign for our ecology. Other good news is that we had many eagle sightings on the lake last summer. One spring we will find that bald eagles have moved in to overtake the osprey nests. Maybe this year?

Be aware that the Township will continue to inspect septic systems this year. Research shows that unmaintained septic systems can have a detrimental impact on the quality of lakes. We can all benefit by helping each other out with this issue. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact an LBLA Board member. Note that we are not part of the Township leadership and will **not** report people to the Township.

My other passion is our LBLA website which I urge you to check out. In the spring, I link up to webcams that monitor eagle, osprey, loon and other wildlife nests. Watching these sites seemingly helps prolong my time at the lake. This

winter. I scanned old newsletters and minutes to add them to the website. We can now accept membership payments by PayPal -just go to the business section on the website. We also have a Facebook page so check it out and 'like' us. There is a new cottage rental tab on our website enabling you to advertise rental property on the lake. LBLA and attendance is free of charge.



### CLIMATE CHANGE AT THE LAKE

LBLA reps attended the 2012 Lake Links workshop focused on climate change impacts on our environment. Studies show that our winters are becoming

less snowy and milder by almost 5 degrees in the period 1882 to 2006. Maple syrup runs earlier in

the year, and hot dry summers are more frequent. Cottagers and tourists may enjoy the warmer summers, but we are seeing increased fire risks and wind damage to property as well as treacherous small craft boating conditions due to wind. Warmer temperatures have led to increases in mosquito and tick-borne diseases like West Nile or Lyme disease. There are some positives to warmer winters: contractors & real estate agents can work almost yearround, there is less snow to clear and heating bills are reduced. However, lake ice has become dangerous, snowmobilina & winter sports conditions are poor.

the forestry season is shorter and road maintenance is challenging.

We can anticipate that temperatures will rise from 3 to 8 degrees over the next century. Already the Insurance Bureau of Canada says they have paid out \$1B a year for the last three years in property insurance claims from catastrophic or extreme weather events. Climate change may cause flooding in the spring & fall, inundating crops and sending fertilizers into our lake from stream run-offs. Changing groundwater levels might affect your well, your dock and your boating safety as shoals appear where they were covered before. Climate-driven increases water temperatures could make some rivers and lakes unsuitable for the fish that now live there and invite fish diseases and invading species, like zebra mussels and the round goby. Warming waters may send fish species such as bass or perch closer to the bottom of our lakes where the

water will be cooler. Frogs may leave dried-up ponds & wetlands & become road-kill, trees will drop their leaves earlier and hemlock will decline but white pine will flourish.

Lake dwellers need to monitor these changes and adapt to climate change by protecting the integrity of the ecosystem. Some individual actions we can take include: shoreline naturalization; installing floating docks to deal with fluctuating water levels; planting native species on our properties; having tic removal kits handy; maintaining clean septic systems to minimize nutrient loading; and understanding that wildlife and fish are also impacted by climate change and respecting their habitat or their spawning seasons. Mother Earth needs our care...

### **OUR LAKE HISTORY**




Many have asked whether we intend to


